SOUVENIR HISTORY

For many years, people passing through the town of Mendocino have been attracted by the dignity of the Masonic hall and the beautiful statuary mounted above it. Masonic brethren have often remarked, "I wish I knew something of its history and the origin of its beauty." It is with this in mind, that this little 'resume' of Mendocino Lodge No. 179 is offered.

In the month of March, in 1865, a group of sojourning Masonic brethren met at the store of Wm. Heeser on Main street, to take initiatory steps toward the formation of a Lodge Home of their own. Most of them were hardy pioneers of this country, lumbermen, farmers, etc. They were proud of their little town of Mendocino California, with its three good hotels, its lumber mill, its stores; with the forests east of it and the Pacific Ocean to the west. The records show those present to have been as follows:

These men sincerely hoped to organize a Lodge that they and others to follow, could enjoy and be proud of, and the records show that they even exceeded their hopes and expectations. A second meeting was held on the 3rd of July following, with the same brethren present plus J. B. Rice, John Chiever, G. E. Cummings, A. J. Rogers and G. Canning Smith.

Much was accomplished for one meeting, motions being carried to name the lodge 'Mendocino Lodge.' (Although the records show a letter from the Grand Secretary, Alex Abell, dated October 23, 1865, saying that Grand Master Belcher did not wish a lodge named after him.)

Brother F. B. Lowell was nominated as Chairman; Brother G. Canning Smith, Secretary; Brother Erick Albertson, Master; Brother Wm. Heeser, Senior Warden; and Brother George R. Lowell, Junior Warden. They carried a motion to petition the Grand Lodge of the State of California for dispensation to organize and carry on the work of a Masonic Lodge in Mendocino.

The petition for Dispensation originally made to The Most Worshipful William Caldwell Belcher was granted October 23, 1865, by Grand Master Gilbert B. Clairborne.

The first year was indeed a busy one for the new lodge. Nine meetings were held in the month of December of 1865, alone. They met in the loft of a building owned by Wm. Heeser (not now standing) and the records show payment of \$50 rent for several years' use. On December 2, 1865, the first degree was conferred, and the first candidate was raised on Christmas Day, Brother Samuel Clark. When the lodge was one year old, the first delegate was sent to the Grand be had or afforded and sawdust was used on the floor. The only chairs owned by the Lodge were used for the various stations and hard benches were provided for the sitting of the brethren.

Items show candles at \$7 a box, later at \$4 a box. The History of Mendocino and Lake Counties, published in 1914, says that the first electric lights for the Lodge were from power generated at a plant near the lumber mill and provided for 12 cents a kilowatt.

Some of the brackets for the first oil lamps are mounted on the Lodge walls to this day, and are made of decorative iron. Our present Tyler, Brother L. Larsen, tells how his brother from Denmark, John C. Larsen, then a young man, did much of the painting of the Lodges' interior.

One thing of interest to note is that the original Bible is still in use. It came from Tyro Lodge, Dry Town, Amador County, which same Lodge passed out of existence December 27, 1859. Just how Mendocino Lodge came into the posses-

sion of this Bible the records do not indicate.

We look back with reverence and admiration when we consider the hard work that our early brethren had to do to provide a Lodge hall that still is one of the most beautiful in the State. In each corner of the Lodge room a Corinthian column is set, in the East, two columns of Ionic are set, in the West two of Doric, and in the South two of Corinthian. All the fluting and decorating are molded in plaster of paris and set into the wood. The two brazen pillars adjacent to the door of the preparation room are also made by hand; the decorations of the chapiters, molded of brass, were cast at the saw mill at Mendocino and were made by Brother Hagenmeyer, the mill blacksmith.

A great deal of credit is due the early Brothers of this Lodge for carrying on so successfully, a work against so great odds. Brother Albertson stands out especially for seven years of continuous hard work, much of which was without personal compensation, and was four times Master of the Lodge. It was he who carved the beautiful statuary which adorns the outside of the building, and the beautiful carving on the Lodge's interior is the work of his hands. He worked at the lumber mill and had a shack on the beach where he spent all of his spare time doing this work, truly a work of love.

In 1871 Brother Albertson was evidently in financial straits, for the records show the Lodge taking care of his wife's doctor bill. The comments of the auditing committee show the love and true Yankee instinct that prevailed in the Lodge in those early days.

The first Senior Warden, Mr. William Heeser, many years Secretary of the Lodge, donated the land for the building. He was a licensed surveyor, owned a store, published a newspaper, ran a bank, built a road from Ukiah to Mendocino, and purchased the Kelly farm which was the first cultivated farm in the district.

All available records point to the fact that our early Masonic breth-

ren were quite public spirited citizens and practiced out of the Lodge those great virtues inculcated in it.

No year since the Lodge started has been without its own interest, but the first seven years stand out, under the precept and example of Brother Albertson, four times Master of the Lodge.
